**Students enrolled for a eight or more hours receive the full-time tuition discount. M.A.P.C. students enrolled for a combined total of eight or more hours are also eligible for the discount (which applies only to the hours at Phoenix Seminary). M.A.P.C. students pay the standard part-time tuition rate, and then provide documentation from Ottawa University indicating the number of hours in process there. After the course drop deadline has passed, a refund will be credited to the student's account according to the number of credits taken at Phoenix Seminary.

TUITION POLICIES

Spouse Tuition Policy (Partners in Ministry): Spouses of M.Div., M.A.B.L., and Diploma students may enroll for credit or non-credit courses with no cost for tuition. To be eligible, spouses must submit the [Application for Admission](#), [Partners in Ministry Application](#), and Registration Form. Some restrictions apply. Alumni Tuition Policy: Alumni may register for any course (except D.Min.) as non-credit, non-transcribed Alumni Enrichment with no charge for tuition or fees.

January Term Intensive Courses

Monday–Wednesday–Friday (January 4 – 22)

BI 506 – Old and New Testament Introduction 6:00pm-9:30pm
A general overview of introductory and critical issues associated with the study of the Old and New Testaments including: historical, geographical and cultural backgrounds; the formation of the canon; and the transmission of the biblical text. This course also includes training on biblical and theological computer software.

[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Paul Wegner](#). Next Offered: Summer 2011. Required for: M.Div. Concentration elective for Dipl. B.S. Prerequisite: BI 501. Notes: Course meets M-W-F, 6:00pm-9:30pm, January 4-22. Class will not meet on January 18 in honor of Martin Luther King Day.]

Monday–Tuesday–Wednesday–Thursday (January 11 – 14)

TH 515 – Biblical Perspectives on Christian Prayer 8:00am-3:50pm
Explores what the Bible teaches and illustrates concerning prayer and the God to whom we pray. Students will be asked to reflect on challenges to a biblically informed Christian spirituality posed by life in a post-modern, technological society.

[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Bing Hunter](#). Frequency: Occasional. Concentration elective for Dipl. B.S. Prerequisite: None. Notes: Course meets M-T-W-TH, 8:00am-3:50pm, January 11-14.]

CF 595 – Mending the Soul: Understanding and Healing Abuse & Trauma 8:00am-3:50pm

Weekend Intensive & Doctor of Ministry Courses

Saturdays (Feb. 6, March 6, March 27); Friday (March 26)

LD 508 – Conflict Resolution in the Church 8:00am-4:50pm
Biblical instruction on becoming a godly manager of conflict. The sources of conflict and strategies of conflict resolution will be explained, illustrated and systematically applied.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Roger Ball](#). Frequency: Every Spring. Required for M.Div. L.D. and Dipl. I.S. Concentration Elective for M.A.B.L. and Dipl. L.D. Prerequisite: None. Notes: Concurrent enrollment in CD 595 or CD 596 is suggested. Course meets Sat. 2/6 (8:00am- 4:50pm), Sat. 3/6 (8:00am- 4:50pm), Friday 3/26 (6:00pm-9:50pm), and Sat. 3/27 (8:00am- 4:50pm).]

Monday–Tuesday–Wednesday–Thursday–Friday (March 15 – 19)

DM 706 – Growing & Multiplying Missional Churches 8:00am-4:50pm
This course provides a study of biblical and contemporary principles and procedures of church growth and health. Included in the study will be a look at appropriate strategies for bringing about change in a local church.
[4 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Gary McIntosh](#). Frequency: Occasional. Elective for D.Min. Prerequisite: None. Notes: Course Meets from Monday 3/15 – Friday 3/19 (8:00am-4:50pm). Final class session ends at noon on Friday. Enrollment is limited to D.Min. students. The [D.Min. Application for Admission](#) and [D.Min Registration Packet](#) should be submitted no later than December 1st.]

SPRING 2010 COURSE SCHEDULE

Mondays (Daytime Courses)

BI 505 – NT Survey I: Gospels 10:00am-11:50am
A survey of the Gospels giving an overview of the life of Christ with an emphasis upon Second Temple Judaism and the social worlds of Galilee, Samaria, and Judea. Develops your ability to think biblically by interrelating theological convictions and making personal application.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. John DelHousaye](#). Frequency: Every Fall & Spring. Required for all programs. Prerequisite: None.]

BI 501 – Principles for Biblical Interpretation 1:00pm-4:50pm
A study of the principles involved in accurately interpreting the word of God. This course is designed to help you understand what the Bible says as well as what it means by what it says. Provides the foundation for further study in theology and biblical literature courses.
[4 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Fred Chay](#). Frequency: Every Fall & Spring. Required within first 30 hours for all programs except Dipl. C.C. and M.A.P.C. Prerequisite: None.]

MI 506 – Creative Bible Teaching 1:00pm-2:50pm
Expand your creative potential while learning how to teach the Word using sound teaching principles that make learning relevant to the student's life. You will increase your teaching skills through hands-on application of what you have learned.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Norm Wakefield](#). Frequency: Every Spring. Concentration Elective for M.Div. C.F. and M.Div. L.D. Prerequisite: None.]

MS 512 – Christian Ministry and Culture 3:00pm-4:50pm
An introduction to social and cultural anthropology, and a study of the insights these disciplines provide for ministry in contemporary societies.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Malcolm Hartnell](#). Frequency: Occasional. Concentration Elective for Dipl. I.S. Prerequisite: None.]

NT 504 – Improving Greek Reading Skills 3:00pm-4:50pm
A verse-by-verse reading of Ephesians with an opportunity to apply the class discussion to a personal study of Colossians. The skills introduced in NT 503 are deepened, especially textual criticism.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. John DelHousaye](#). Frequency: Every Spring. Required for M.Div. B.C. Concentration elective for Dipl. B.S. Prerequisite: NT 503.]

OT 502 – Hebrew Grammar II 3:00pm-4:50pm
A continuation of OT 501 completing the Hebrew grammar sequence. The student will continue to learn Hebrew vocabulary and the goal in this course is to continue learning Hebrew grammar, primarily the Hebrew Weak Verb forms. After completing this course the student should have the necessary skills to begin developing competence in exegesis.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Paul Wegner](#). Frequency: Every Spring. Required for M.Div. B.C. Concentration elective for Dipl. B.S. Prerequisite: OT 501.]

TH 506 – Contemporary Moral Issues 3:00pm-4:50pm
This course will teach you how to practically apply God's truth to the toughest issues facing our culture such as divorce / remarriage, homosexuality, abortion, race relations, and euthanasia.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Wayne Grudem](#). Frequency: Every Fall (and occasional Spring semesters). Required for M.Div., M.A.B.L., M.A.P.C., and Dipl. C.C. Concentration elective for Dipl. B.S. Prerequisites: None.]

SPRING 2010 COURSE SCHEDULE

Mondays (Evening Courses)

CD 501 – Living in God's Presence 6:00pm-7:50pm
This course gives you the opportunity to explore the process and blessing of living in God's presence. The Christian life is viewed through the lens of God's transforming grace and unchanging truth. You will discover practical ways to enrich your relationship with the Lord.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Norm Wakefield](#). Frequency: Every Spring. Required within first 30 hours for all programs. Prerequisite: None.]

MS 510 – World Religions 6:00pm-7:50pm
An examination of the major world religions and ideologies in order to understand their principal doctrines and practices and the subsequent implications for Christian witness. Special attention is given to Islam, Hinduism, and Folk Religion.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Malcolm Hartnell](#). Frequency: Occasional. Concentration Elective for Dipl. I.S. Prerequisite: None.]

TH 520 – The Character of God 6:00pm-7:50pm
A biblical and theological analysis of several less-understood attributes of God, including immutability, eternity, omnipresence, and Trinitarian existence. Attention will be given to biblical support for each attribute, classical formulations, recent challenges, and application to life.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Wayne Grudem](#). Frequency: Rare. Concentration elective for Dipl. B.S. Prerequisite: None.]

BI 503 – OT Survey III: Prophets 8:00pm-9:50pm
A survey of the prophets in their historical and cultural context. This course covers the outstanding features and basic teachings of each book within the broader context of God's total, progressive revelation, while discerning practical principles for contemporary Christian living.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Paul Wegner](#). Frequency: Every Fall & Spring. Required for all programs except Dipl. C.C. and M.A.P.C. Prerequisite: None.]

WR 101 – Research Writing Review 8:00pm-9:50pm
The course will review the basic elements of writing a research paper. Included will be reading and writing techniques that cover parts of speech, reading for specific content, paragraph structure & composition, formulating an argument, title pages, footnotes, and bibliographies. Assignments will be progressive and students will have their writing reviewed weekly.
[Transcribed non-credit. Instructor: [John Correia](#). Frequency: Every Semester. Required within the first two semesters for all credit students. Prerequisite: None. Notes: [Advanced Standing](#) is possible. Contact the [Registrar](#) for details. Reduced-tuition (\$250) course. 10 sessions only (Jan. 25 – April 5).]

SPRING 2010 COURSE SCHEDULE

Tuesdays (Evening Courses)

BC 502 – Expository Communication II 4:00pm-5:50pm
Emphasis moves from oral skills to the art of preaching. Creativity is encouraged as students find their own style. Lectures cover topics such as preaching on controversial issues, impromptu, evangelistic and crisis preaching, the use of media, training lay expositors, preaching for video, creating oral text in oral format, and sermon mapping.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Chip Moody](#). Frequency: Every Spring. Required for: M.Div. B.C. Prerequisite: BC 500 & BC 501. Notes: Enrollment is limited. Preference is given to M.Div. B.C. students.]

CF 512 – Counseling Adults from Dysfunctional & Abusive Families 4:00pm-5:50pm
Examine dysfunctional families (e.g., alcoholic, battering, incestuous) with a focus on the issues facing those who grew up in them. It also provides basic counseling strategies and practical tools to help these survivors overcome their painful pasts.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Justin Smith](#). Frequency: Even Springs. Concentration Elective for: M.A.P.C. and Dipl. C.C. Prerequisites: CF 500 & CF 509 or instructor's consent.]

TH 501 – God, Scripture, Revelation, and the Holy Spirit 6:00pm-9:50pm
Introduces you to the process of thinking theologically and focuses on the Person of God as the source of all knowledge and wisdom. You'll begin with a study of the inspiration, inerrancy, and authority of Scripture. You'll then explore the nature of God, the Trinity, and the work of God in creation and providence. You will also study more in-depth the person of the Holy Spirit.
[4 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Wayne Grudem](#). Frequency: Every Spring. Required for M.Div. and M.A.B.L. Prerequisites: BI 501. Notes: May substitute for TH 500 in the Graduate Diploma.]

OT 500 – Introduction to Hebrew 6:00pm-8:50pm
Provides foundational knowledge and skills that can assist with Hebrew exegesis and translation when using tools such as commentaries and language software. Goals are to learn the alphabet, to develop a vocabulary of 150 words, to gain understanding of basic Hebrew grammar and paradigms, and to develop confidence in the use of commentaries and language software for exegetical study (interpretation of the biblical text) of Ruth. Incorporates major Hebrew language tools and computer analysis tools.
[3 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Paul Wegner](#). Frequency: Every Spring or Fall. Required for M.Div. C.F. and M.Div. L.D. Concentration elective for Dipl. B.S. Prerequisite: None.]

BC 500 – Methodology of Biblical Communication 6:00pm-7:50pm
This is the first of a three-course sequence designed to develop speech/rhetorical skills essential to effective oral communication, with a view to their application to Bible teaching and expository preaching. Uses New Testament passages to develop structures for oral communication and proper handling of biblical texts. Some familiarity with Greek or Hebrew is helpful, but not required.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Chip Moody](#). Frequency: Every Spring. Required for: M.Div. B.C. Prerequisite: None. Notes: Enrollment is limited. Preference is given to M.Div. B.C. students.]

MI 502 – Principles of Biblical Counseling 6:00pm-7:50pm
Examines the biblical foundation for pastoral counseling as well as the historical role and origin of the care of persons within the church. Biblical principles for guiding, sustaining, healing, and reconciling individuals are explored as are common circumstances that draw people to seek biblical counsel and care.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Justin Smith](#). Frequency: Every Spring or Fall. Required for M.Div. Concentration Elective for M.A.B.L. and Dipl. W.S. Prerequisite: None.]

SPRING 2010 COURSE SCHEDULE

Wednesdays (Evening Courses)

BI 504 – NT Survey II: Acts & Pauline Epistles 6:00pm-7:50pm
A survey of the Acts & Pauline Epistles. Special attention is given to the Jewish and Greco-Roman social contexts of the authors, and to how their inspired, Jesus-centered teachings inspire believers today. Develops your ability to think biblically by interrelating theological convictions and making personal application.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. John DelHousaye](#). Frequency: Every Spring. Required for: all programs except Dipl. C.C. and M.A.P.C. Prerequisite: None. Notes: For programs requiring the four-credit BI 504 Acts to Revelation, take both BI 504 / BI 508 to satisfy this requirement.]

MI 507 – Evangelism & Discipleship 6:00pm-7:50pm
Provides the foundation for students to develop both a personal and church-based approach to evangelism and discipleship. Investigates implications for evangelism arising from contemporary American culture and examines specific evangelistic and discipling models and tools that have proved to be effective in the American cultural environment.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Malcolm Hartnell](#). Frequency: Every Spring. Required for M.Div. and M.A.B.L. Concentration Elective for Dipl. I.S. Prerequisite: None. Notes: Concurrent enrollment in CD 595 or CD 596 is suggested.]

BI 508 – NT Survey III: General Epistles & Revelation 8:00pm-9:50pm
A survey of the General Epistles & Revelation. Special attention is given to the Jewish and Greco-Roman social contexts of the authors, and to how their inspired, Jesus-centered teachings inspire believers today. Develops your ability to think biblically by interrelating theological convictions and making personal application.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. John DelHousaye](#). Frequency: Every Spring. Required for: all programs except Dipl. C.C. and M.A.P.C. Prerequisite: None. Notes: For programs requiring the four-credit BI 504 Acts to Revelation, take both BI 504 / BI 508 to satisfy this requirement.]

MI 504 – World Outreach 8:00pm-9:50pm
An introduction to the theory and practice of missiology which challenges students to find their place in fulfilling the Great Commission. Some of the major missiological topics surveyed are: theology, history, anthropology, living in a cross-cultural environment, and the role of the church as both the agent and aim of mission.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Malcolm Hartnell](#). Frequency: Every Spring. Required for M.Div., M.A.B.L., and Dipl. L.D. Prerequisite: None.]

Thursdays (Daytime & Evening Courses)

CF 530 – Counseling Pre-Practicum Lecture Time TBD
The Counseling Pre-Practicum is designed to integrate students into client-based environments under the care of qualified ministry supervisors. Students will experience training critical to their counseling skills as well as learn about the dynamics of clinical practice. This summative experience combines knowledge of Scripture, a knowledge of counseling theory, counseling skills, biblical character, and gifts of the Spirit into a unified, coherent experience. Students bring together these different skills and are matched with actual clients in a real life counseling setting. All Pre-Practicum students will complete their hours at Scottsdale Bible Church Counseling Ministries (www.scottsdalebible.com/ministries/counseling).

[2-3 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Justin Smith](#). Frequency: Every Semester. Required for: M.Div. C.F. (2 hours), M.A.P.C. and Dipl. C.C. (3 hours). Prerequisites: at least 15 counseling hours including MI 502, CF 500, CF 503, CF 509, and for M.A.P.C. students, Ottawa University's PYF 8012. Notes: Lecture time is for Dip. C.C., M.A.P.C., and M.Div. C.F. students. Enrollment is very limited: contact Roma Royer at royer@ps.edu to secure a spot on the waiting list. The CF 530 Pre-Practicum Registration Packet (available from the CF 530 course page on www.pscourses.org) should be submitted well before the start of the semester in which you intend to complete your Pre-Practicum.]

TH 503 – Salvation, the Church and the Future 6:00pm-9:50pm
Enrich your spiritual life as you learn of the work of the Spirit of God in salvation and of His present ministry to and through the Church. You'll also study the future glorious consummation of God's kingdom program.
[4 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Fred Chay](#). Frequency: Every Spring. Required for M.Div. and M.A.B.L. Concentration elective for Dipl. B.S. Prerequisites: BI 501 & TH 501.]

CF 509a – Integration of Psychology & Christianity (for MDiv CF) 6:00pm-7:50pm
An introduction to the varied ways people approach the competing claims of psychology, counseling, and the Christian faith tradition. Attention will be given to competing Christian views of the role of science, faith, and scripture as applied to counseling and pastoral care.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Justin Smith](#). Frequency: Every Spring. Required for: M.Div. C.F. (2 hours). Prerequisite: None.]

CF 509b – Integration of Psychology & Christianity (for Dipl CC-OU) 6:00pm-8:50pm
An introduction to the varied ways people approach the competing claims of psychology, counseling, and the Christian faith tradition. Attention will be given to competing Christian views of the role of science, faith, and scripture as applied to counseling and pastoral care.
[3 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Justin Smith](#). Frequency: Every Spring. Required for: M.A.P.C. and Dipl. C.C. (3 hours). Prerequisite: None.]

LD 501 – Shepherding God's People 6:00pm-7:50pm
Develop the skills essential to enfolding and nurturing God's people in the context of the local church. Learn how to shepherd God's people and create an environment that encourages and stimulates growth.
[2 hours. Instructor: [Professor Jonathan Logan](#). Frequency: Even Springs. Required for M.Div. L.D. and M.A.B.L. Concentration Elective for Dipl. L.D. Prerequisite: None. Notes: Concurrent enrollment in CD 595 or CD 596 is suggested.]

Internships*

BC 540 – Biblical Communication Internship I

Designed for the M.Div. B.C. student to develop and refine biblical communication and other skills in preparation for vocational ministry. You will grow in competency through substantial ministry responsibility and accountability to a competent ministry supervisor. Six hours per week for one semester (or a total of 90 hours)

[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Chip Moody](#). Frequency: Every Semester. Required for M.Div. B.C. Prerequisite: None. Notes: The Internship Information and Registration Packet (available from the BC 540 course page on www.pscourses.org) should be submitted to the Director of Field Education well before the start of the semester in which the student plans to complete an Internship and no later than the 2nd Friday of the semester.]

CF 540 – Counseling & Family Internship

Designed for the M.Div. C.F. student to develop and refine counseling skills in preparation for vocational ministry. You will grow in competency through substantial ministry responsibility and accountability to a competent ministry supervisor. Six hours per week for one semester (or a total of 90 hours).

[2 hours. Instructor: [Dr. Justin Smith](#). Frequency: Every Semester. Required for M.Div. C.F. Prerequisites: at least 15 counseling hours including MI 502, CF 500, CF 503, CF 509, and CF 530. Notes: The Internship Information and Registration Packet (available from the CF 540 course page on www.pscourses.org) should be submitted to the Director of Field Education well before the start of the semester in which the student plans to complete an Internship and no later than the 2nd Friday of the semester.]

LD 540 / 541 – Leadership Development Internship I / II

Designed for the M.Div. L.D. or M.A.B.L. student to develop and refine ministry leadership skills in preparation for vocational ministry. You will grow in competency through substantial ministry responsibility and accountability to a competent ministry supervisor. Six hours per week for one semester (or a total of 90 hours).

Ministry Exposures**

FM 501 – Ministry Exposure: Cross-Cultural

Three hours per week for one semester (or a total of 45 hours).

TH 599 – Theological Oral Examination

The satisfactory completion of the comprehensive Theological Oral Examination is a graduation requirement for students in the Master of Divinity and Master of Arts in Biblical Leadership programs. Exams are proctored by two to three resident faculty members and usually last between 30-45 minutes.

The protégé and mentor interact over the contents of the PDF during their monthly meetings, and it will be evaluated in assessment semesters using the PDF Checklist. SPRING 2010 INSTITUTE FOR THEOLOGICAL STUDIES

The [Institute of Theological Studies](#) is a para-church ministry founded to provide accessible graduate-level independent studies for seminary students. ITS courses and lecturers are approved by a council of evangelical seminary deans. Courses materials (MP-3/Data CDs, to be kept by the student) must be purchased by the student for \$80, in addition to normal credit tuition. Courses may be taken for elective credit by M.Div., M.A.B.L., and Diploma students. Certain courses may be taken for core credit upon prior approval by academic petition. Each course is equivalent to two credit hours unless otherwise noted. For more information see page 56 of the [2009-2010 Student Handbook](#).

ITS: Church History

ICH 501 – The Ancient Church

2 credit hours

Richard C. Gamble, Th.D. Examines the history of the ancient church in detail. Following a historical progression, the course covers the development of doctrine and introduces the student to the main figures in the Patristic Age.

ICH 504 – The Theology of Jonathan Edwards

2 credit hours

John H. Gerstner, Ph.D. A detailed examination of the theology of Jonathan Edwards. Taking a topical approach, the course covers Edwards' teaching regarding all the major points of systematic theology with particular emphasis on Edwards' unique theological contributions.

ICH 509 – The Theology of Martin Luther

2 credit hours

Robert Kolb, Ph.D. This course surveys the background and setting of Luther's thought as well as his teaching on the range of topics which form Christian theology. It focuses on Luther's doctrines of sin and grace, justification and faith, law and gospel, as well as on his understanding of Christian daily living in the midst of God's callings within the world.

ICH 511 – Augustine & Medieval Theology

2 credit hours

Scott T. Carroll, Ph.D. A comprehensive introduction to Augustine: his life, his works, and his legacy in the Medieval Church. Surveying Augustine's life as a pastor, teacher, and writer, students are encouraged to evaluate his contribution to the development of medieval theology and to apply those contributions to their own lives and ministries.

ITS: Intercultural Studies

IWM 508 – African Theology & Religions

2 credit hours

Tite Tienou, Ph.D. This course is an introduction to Christian theologizing in Africa against the background of African cultures and religions. Since Africa has witnessed a rapid expansion of the Christian faith, it is imperative that people interested in African Christian ministry familiarize themselves with the major issues involved in developing authentic Christian theology within the contemporary context of the continent.

ITS: Ministry Studies

IMT 510 – Biblical Preaching: A Pastor's Look at Homiletics

2 credit hours

John R. W. Stott, D.D. Dr. Stott offers his unique perspective on the task of biblical preaching, focusing on what pastors need to understand as they engage the preaching task. Dr. Stott addresses the arguments that opponents of preaching have raised and offers a passionate defense and plea for expository preaching. He also provides key insights on how a pastor should view the authority of the Bible, how to approach biblical interpretation, sermon preparation, and delivery.

SPRING 2010 INSTITUTE FOR THEOLOGICAL STUDIES

ITS: New Testament

INT 501 – The Sermon on the Mount

2 credit hours

John R. W. Stott, D.D. An exposition of the Sermon on the Mount emphasizing distinctive character that is expected of the Christian and on the authority of the Lord Jesus Christ. Emphasizes the practical and spiritual application of the Sermon on the Mount and its related theological issues and historical interpretations.

INT 502 – The Pastoral Epistles

2 credit hours

John R. W. Stott, D.D. An expository and exegetical study of 1 and 2 Timothy and Titus, with emphasis on their exegetical and interpretive problems. Explores their theology and practical relevance for society and the Church, especially church leadership.

INT 503 – The Epistle to the Romans

2 credit hours

Harold W. Hoehner, Ph.D. An exegetical-theological study of Paul's Epistle to the Romans in the Greek text. It involves the treatment of selected historical, grammatical, structural, and lexical data which illuminates the meaning of this important New Testament document. This course assumes the ability to make grammatical and textual critical evaluations, to do Greek exegesis, as well as Greek word studies.

INT 505 – The Parables of Jesus

2 credit hours

Craig L. Blomberg, Ph.D. Surveys methods of interpreting Jesus' parables to develop an eclectic model drawing on the best insights. This model is applied to the major narrative parables to draw conclusions concerning the theology and significance of this portion of Jesus' teaching.

INT 506 – The Gospel of Luke

2 credit hours

Darrell L. Bock, Ph.D. An examination of the Gospel of Luke with concentration on its message and on preparation of narrative material for preaching and teaching.

INT 507 – The Acts of the Apostles

2 credit hours

Darrell L. Bock, Ph.D. An exegetical examination of Acts focusing on the biblical theology of the book, the historical background of events, and the theological emphasis of the speeches. Special attention is given to the relationship between the Church and Israel in the early church era.

INT 508 – New Testament Survey: Epistles to Revelation

4 credit hours

Craig L. Blomberg, Ph.D. Surveys the NT epistles and the Apocalypse. Introductory issues and the basic content of the books are emphasized as well as inductive study of selected passages.

INT 511 – The Christian and New Testament Theology

2 credit hours

Scott J. Hafemann, Ph.D. Study the discipline and task of New Testament Theology by confronting the issues of biblical theology within Old and New Testament contexts. Lectures address the origin and nature of sin and the Fall, God's sovereignty and human freedom, the law/gospel contrast, the need for and contours of the New Covenant, and the significance of Christ within the history of Israel. **Available on audio cassette only.**

ITS: Old Testament

IOT 501 – The Pentateuch

2 credit hours

R. Laird Harris, Ph.D. A study of the contents of the Pentateuch against its archaeological background together with consideration of the problems of evolution and higher criticism.

IOT 505 – The Book of Psalms

2 credit hours

Bruce K. Waltke, Th.D., Ph.D. An introduction to the Book of Psalms, with emphasis on the principles involved in the exegesis of the hymnic literature. Special attention is given to the various forms of the Psalms, their settings within the historical experience of Israel, and their application today within the Church. A knowledge of Hebrew is helpful but not required.

SPRING 2010 INSTITUTE FOR THEOLOGICAL STUDIES

ITS: Old Testament (continued)

IOT 506 – Understanding the Old Testament

2 credit hours

Bruce K. Waltke, Th.D., Ph.D. A survey of the history of salvation in the Old Testament, especially as it relates to the central theme of Old Testament theology: the rule of God or the establishment of God's kingdom upon the earth. A knowledge of Hebrew is helpful but not required.

IOT 507 – The Book of Proverbs

2 credit hours

Bruce K. Waltke, Th.D., Ph.D. An exegetical study of The Book of Proverbs in its cultural, historical, and literary settings with attention to critical and hermeneutical problems. A knowledge of Hebrew is helpful but not required.

IOT 509 – The Christian & Old Testament Theology

2 credit hours

Walter C. Kaiser, Jr., Ph.D. Examines the foundational theology applied by the OT for the NT and the Church. This study identifies the focal point for the theology of both the OT and the NT.

IOT 511 – Old Testament Theology I: Pentateuch and Former Prophets

2 credit hours

Richard E. Averbeck, Ph.D. Introduces the content and theology of these books, identifying the foundational themes that emerge and tracing them through the rest of the Bible demonstrating how the theology of the Old Testament is basic and essential for understanding Jesus Christ, the Church, and the Christian life.

IOT 512 – Old Testament Theology II: Latter Prophets and Writings

2 credit hours

Richard E. Averbeck, Ph.D. The history, poetry, wisdom, and prophecy of the Latter Prophets and Writings are essential for fully grasping the meaning and message of Jesus' teaching and our mission in the world today. In this course, Dr. Richard E. Averbeck introduces the content and theology of Job-Malachi, not merely surveying but rather working through the books section-by-section, focusing on major passages and their theological connections throughout all Scripture (Old and New Testament).

ITS: Theology

IST 503 – Contemporary Theology I

2 credit hours

John S. Feinberg, Ph.D. An examination of some of the major trends in contemporary thought. Begins with a review of the major developments in Western thought prior to Hegel, and then explores the theologies of Hegel, Kierkegaard, Barth, Bultmann, Tillich, Van Buren, and Altizer.

IST 504 – The Doctrines of Man and Sin

2 credit hours

Roger R. Nicole, Th.D., Ph.D. A critical and historical overview of positions regarding the nature of mankind, both as the image of God and as a being corrupted by sin. Presented from a Reformed perspective with a fair treatment of differing views and objections.

IST 505 – The Doctrine of Salvation

2 credit hours

Roger R. Nicole, Th.D., Ph.D. A critical and historical overview of the plan and order of salvation, tracing each movement of the process from our regeneration to our final glorification. Presented from a Reformed perspective with a fair treatment of differing views and objections.

IST 506 – The Doctrine of the Trinity

2 credit hours

Peter Toon, D.Phil. Presents the historic, classic, and orthodox doctrine of the Holy Trinity. Following a biblical, historical, and dogmatic approach, demonstrates how and why the classical doctrine/dogma emerged in the 4th century, major ways this dogma has been understood, and how crucial this teaching is for understanding our relationship with God.
